Wishes launched for memorial scholarship

MEREDITH — Hundreds of glowing lanterns gathered in the air as a crowd of friends and family gathered in honor of a local woman.

On Saturday, over a hundred people gathered at Moulton Farm for the second annual Launch-A-Wish benefit to raise money for the Diane K. Kline Scholarship Fund.

Diane Kamercia Kline, a longtime resident of Center Harbor who worked in education for 33 years. Diane Kline graduated from Belknap College with a Bachelor of Science degree in Elementary Education in 1973 and receiving a Masters of Education from Plymouth State College in 1997. Diane then taught school in Gilford, Laconia, and Plymouth. Her educational work also lead her to teach in the Eskimo village of Ekwok, Alaska. She also co-founded and co-directed the Cotton-Tail College Preschool in Center Harbor

She was also a member of the Center Harbor Planning Board and was elected the town's first female selectman.

She died on July 13, 2010 af-

Around 4:30 p.m. the crowd gathered in the cornfield in the back of the store, a change in field location from last year due to winds. Volunteers helped light the lanterns and people held them up and let them fly into the sky. In just a few minutes hundreds of colorful lanterns floated into the air above Moulton Farm.

"I think it's terrific, it's a great tribute for my wife Diane and it brings people together," Kline said.

Kline said the event is "an uplifting thing" that is great for the community.
